Introduction by the Chairman

In contrast with the very controversial and unfortunate events of 2006, last year, 2007, was one of consolidation with few issues causing major friction with Government or developers. Our finances have been put on a much stronger footing and the Trust is firmly placed to continue in its appointed role of guardian of Gibraltar's heritage.

In keeping with the now traditional practice, the Minister for Heritage agreed to address our membership at the Annual General Meeting held on 8 November 2007. The Trust is grateful to the Hon E Reyes for this gesture, especially so soon after being appointed as the new Minister for Heritage.

The Trust welcomes the Government's commitment to the beautification of the City Walls, Orange Bastion and King's Bastion especially. We cannot praise enough the attention to detail on embrasures and firing steps. Members have expressed concern regarding the glass windows on Orange Bastion and the RML gun mountings not being authentic. Regarding the windows, on any future enclosures the angle of glass will be tilted to allow a better view. It is a pity that glass is used in the first place but society's disregard for artefacts means that they have to be protected. Regarding the gun carriages, we fully understand that spending upwards of £40,000 on a gun carriage would not seem logical when money could be better directed elsewhere. This is perhaps where the Trust can assist. We are trying to outsource the construction of metal carriages with help from the MOD and little cost to Gibraltar.

Congratulations must be given on the external appearance of King's Bastion. Who would have thought a couple of years ago that this structure would one day be brought back to life, giving an opportunity to describe to visitors the actions that took place years gone by, and utilising the inner yard as a public place. As ever, minor details are brought to our attention which we take up with the project leader, but overall a job well done.

The Waterport entrance to Casemates is almost completed. Thought should be given to the impact on tourists when planning such improvements. This thoroughfare, the main entrance into Gibraltar, is on the 'tourist route', and it could be off-putting to our many visitors. The Trust hopes that the whole Waterport area and Devil's Tongue can also be beautified in due course.

Upper Town regeneration is also an area where the Government has been very active, and the Trust's involvement has been fairly heavy. Much more is to be done. The Trust may be able to give advice on suitable colour schemes for buildings.

Our Vice-Chairman Diane and I have had regular meetings with Carl Viagas, the Government's Heritage Projects Officer, to discuss projects and he is one of our main contacts within Government Departments. This is a very positive move and in our opinion good for the Trust.

The Main Guard (the Trust's premises) - tenders will shortly be invited and we are hopeful of a speedy refurbishment. We still await a lease for the building.

Our Vice-Chairman attends DPC meetings regularly and the Trust is informed on new developments. Although often outvoted, our points and concerns are always put forward.

Heritage Action Committee meetings take place every two months and are well attended; this is the Trust's main point of contact with the Heritage Minister. Good discussions take place and some progress ensues.

Some areas of major concerns are the lack of progress on the listing of buildings, the installation of CCTV cameras at Landport, and most importantly the silence regarding updating of the Gibraltar Heritage Trust Act. This may not be Government's top priority but Heritage is vitally important to the good of the whole of Gibraltar and we hope that this matter is attended to soon.

We do acknowledge the hard work put into the new development plan and commend the Town Planning Office for their input. A few concerns have been noted and reported.

An area where the Trust intends to raise its profile is that of illegal buildings and works. Members often raise their concerns and these are passed on to relevant Government departments, then "nothing". We will be encouraging our members to become more vocal by naming and shaming. If necessary we will resort to the courts to protect our heritage.

The Old Well at Western Hangar - a licence for the site has been given to the Trust by the MOD. The site has been beautified and landscaped. Funding has been committed for the clean up stage, but more may be necessary for the bench, sign and collection box. The Friends of Gibraltar Heritage Society have indicated interest in funding part of this project. Incidentally, any monies raised by way of donations are to be shared by the Trust and the RAF Benevolent Fund.

The Garrison Library. The book restoration project continues. Proposals have been put to the Trust that some of the grant may be used to acquire replacement books rather than restore when more economical. In conjunction with the library we also restored a cup found in the Convent relating to the Calpe Hunt in 1929. We have also assisted in restoring the railings around the front perimeter of the building.

When the Government announced plans to build in the North Gorge, the Trust became alarmed at the sheer size of the project. It felt this was immense. Plans for some 400 flats seemed too much. At one end lies Judge's Cave, a listed monument; at the other a series of underground chambers known as the cold meat stores. These stores were to be breached and lost like the Rosia Tanks. We made some investigations and found plans relating to 3 levels of structures with tunnels connecting from Rosia Bay, obviously the 3rd storage facility for the Royal Navy. Water in the tanks, dry goods in the Victualling Yard and cold stores in the North Gorge. We are not opposed to sympathetic development in the North Gorge site but we need to make the public aware of the historical features that exist there.

Polish Book presentation - a chance visit from the Chairman of the Polish Association in Madrid culminated in a fascinating piece of history. I took this gentleman round the sites in Gibraltar that have a connection with Sikorski - Museum, Roman Catholic Cathedral, North Front Cemetery, Sikorski monument and Eastern Beach near the crash site. At this point we gathered some sand near the water's edge to send to Poland for a mausoleum being specially created for General Sikorski - a little piece of Gibraltar is now in Poland. To mark this, I signed a book on behalf of the Trust and people of Gibraltar.

Southport Gate. During a visit to the REME chambers in the centre of the Rock we came across the remains of Southport Gate – left there after visiting Royal Engineers replaced it with another one in 1993. Most of the timber was rotten; however the small wicket gate still intact has been salvaged and has been transferred to the museum. An interesting fact is that the small gate had a keyhole and one of the keys in the Convent would probably fit. Another fascinating piece of heritage.

Each year, visiting Territorial Army regiments visit the Rock to take part in Exercise Marble Tor, in which they conduct military training such as tunnel warfare that they cannot do in the UK. They also undertake community based projects, this year's heritage inspired items have included Flat Bastion Magazine, Witham's Cemetery, work at Princess Anne's Battery, which included restoring and repainting the 5.25 inch anti aircraft guns, Parsons Lodge was cleared out for the Museum team, and finally, work was undertaken in St Paul's Church, Varyl Begg Estate to repair and repaint. All these projects were suggested by the Trust.

The Trust also organised the refurbishment of some plaques and monuments. This year we cleaned and painted the Black Watch Cairn and the Sikorski monument, both twice, the Admiral Rooke statue, the Gibraltar Defence Force soldier and inscription, and the Devils Bellows plaque.

The Trust has been involved with the launch of several books – Gil Podesta's second volume of "Sketches of Old Gibraltar", "Jewish architecture in Gibraltar" by Dr Sharman Kadish, the annual Gibtelecom Gibraltar Heritage Journal, and "Memories of Our Recent Past" by Pepe Morello, just to mention a few. We have also supported the Rock of Ages Holy Trinity Cathedral Campaign jointly with the Friends, and contributed to Freddie Gomez's work at Flat Bastion Magazine and to the memorial to the Gibraltarian evacuees who did not return from Jamaica, organised by Anthony Lara.

This year the painting competition was again very well attended with standards, as ever, high. The prizes were presented by our Patron, His Excellency The Governor, Sir Robert Fulton. The Trust once again thanks the Friends of Gibraltar Heritage Society for their financial support for this event.

Heritage Awards - This year's awards were very well supported with plenty of nominations, which made adjudication difficult. Eventually the Junior Award went to the 1st 4th Scouts for work at O'Hara's Battery.

The Group Award went to JBS for their reproduction of the Koehler Gun carriage, and the Senior Award went to Mario Finlayson in recognition of his artwork depicting the beauty of Gibraltar's architecture, old buildings, churches and views of the bay and for his promotion abroad of characteristic landscapes of Gibraltar. Commendations were also given to Basil Gowen for donating his postcard collection to the people of Gibraltar, and to Eric Rowbottom for his military march CD. Congratulations to all and thanks to the Minister, Fabian Vinet, who presented the awards in the summer.

The lease for Parsons Lodge Battery is being surrendered to the Government and the Museum is using the site as a field centre in connection with the East side cave exploration. We have great hopes that this will eventually assist in achieving World Heritage Status for Gibraltar. With Parsons Lodge acting as a visitor attraction/museum, another possibility could be a waterborne system to transport visitors around to the East side, giving Gibraltar another 'St Michael's Cave' and taking another £10 - £20 per visitor putting more into Gibraltar PLC coffers.

The Royal Marines Memorial - this project gathers pace with possible sites being identified and funding being partially secured. This is another of my pet projects. Gibraltar has no permanent tribute to the Royal Marines. I aim to produce a Cairn with a bronze globe and laurel leaf plaque. Ocean Village have kindly offered a site at the entrance to their development at Marina Bay and I have a tentative unveiling date, with His Excellency Sir Robert Fulton conducting the ceremony. I also intend to install another plaque near to the South Mole where the main engagement took place in 1704, so this could be another recognition for the Marines. After all, they have been promoting Gibraltar for hundreds of years with Gibraltar on their cap badge. It's about time we reciprocated. This project has the support of the Royal Marines Secretariat whose Head visited Gibraltar recently to view the possible sites.

The Calendar – last year before the Friends' Warwick seminar, I accompanied members of their council to the National Army Museum in London, a trip arranged by Sir John Chapple. While there, we were shown a selection of water colours attributed to a Lieutenant Allen. We purchased the rights and have produced this year's calendar with the first 13 images and have another batch for another year or to produce cards. The calendar, as usual, has sold very well.

I must thank all the people who have helped the Trust over the last year, far too many to name individually, but we do appreciate all their assistance. I must name Pepe Rosado for his invaluable support, Roy Potter for his help and Lorna Swift for the use of the Garrison Library. I must also mention two people particularly - Denis King; if you throw a scrap of information to Denis, he researches and produces a report worthy of publishing, a true historian who we hope will return to the Board in the future. Secondly - John Murphy; John and I have over the past 12 months visited tunnels, houses, batteries, in fact almost any site, gathering historical information on Gibraltar. His knowledge is vast, and I thank him for his assistance.

The Board members have all been active. Isobel, who left the Board after the AGM held on 8 November 2007, has been our voice and PR representative. The heritage page will not be the same without her input. Alexis Almeda has also decided to resign after serving 12 years as a Member of the Board, including 5 years as Chairman. We wish Alexis all the best and, in appreciation of his dedicated and exemplary service, the Board has appointed him an Honorary Life Trustee.

New members have been shining. Manolo Galliano, George Russo, Benjamin Marrache, Gil Podesta and John Carreras – I must thank them for their enthusiasm and efforts. In fact the whole Board need to be commended. On behalf of the members and the Board I thank the Treasurer for his work on our accounts and his invaluable advice on financial matters. My thanks also to Brenda our only employee who is still overworked; plans are underway to provide assistance and, of course, a replacement, as she is due to retire next autumn. Again, I must leave my greatest praise to Diane. Always advising and guiding the Trust and myself along the right path, a better deputy no one could have. Last but by no means least, many thanks to you, our members, for your support.

Since writing the above there has been one particular incident that has saddened us all. This is the passing away on 24th January 2008 of Paco Galliano OBE, the Trust's first ever Honorary Life Trustee. Paco was the most stalwart defender of our heritage throughout his life. He was a member of the Museum Committee for 16 years including 7 as Chairman. This Committee was the predecessor of the Heritage Trust. He was appointed a Life Trustee of the Trust in 1998 after having served as its Vice-Chairman for 2 years. Even during prolonged periods of ill health Paco remained committed to the Trust and kept in touch, always willing to give advice and assistance in whatever way he could. He will be missed. We extend our condolences to his wife Lourdes and the rest of his family.
